White to retire

Supreme Court Justice Byron White, one of the two original dissenters from the infamous *Roe v. Wade* decision, announced March 19 that he will retire from the Court at the end of the current term. He has been on the Court since 1962. "President Clinton said he will use a pro-abortion litmus test for Supreme Court appointees, which would automatically rule out many highly qualified legal scholars, even Justice White himself," said NRLC President Wanda Franz, Ph.D.

In memoriam

When 22-year-old Christine Busalacchi died March 7, ten days after the feeding tube that supplied her with food and water was removed on her father's orders, it was an ominous strike against the right to life of medically dependent people everywhere.

"Christine's death was tragic, unnecessary, and a clear sign that the severely disabled are already being starved and dehydrated to death," said NRLC executive director David N. O'Steen, Ph.D.

Christine, who had never given any indication that she would want to be denied food and fluids, suffered severe brain damage in a 1987 auto accident. Since 1990, her father Peter Busalacchi had been involved in a legal battle to remove her feeding tube. He won

permission to do so, as well as to forbid that Christine be given food orally, from a probate court judge in late 1991. The Missouri Supreme Court dismissed efforts to override that ruling in January of this year.

Although several people have testified that Christine was aware of her surroundings, responsive, and able to feel pain, officials at Barnes Hospital in St. Louis, where she died, insisted she was in a "persistent vegetative state." She was moved to Barnes shortly before her death from the Midtown Habilitation Center, where doctors and nurses refused to stop feeding her.

Nurses need help

Hundreds of the 9,000 babies born annually at Hutzel spend the first several weeks of life in nurseries at the hospital in the Detroit Medical Center. They're often babies born prematurely: one of nine births is to a mother who didn't receive prenatal care.

The nurses like to send the babies home with at least an outfit, maybe some booties and a blanket. And they need donations of those items.

Here are more things they need:

- Strollers and mechanical swings. Babies, often several weeks old, want to look around and feel motion. The hospital requests new equipment.
 - · Cassette tapes of gentle music.
- Artwork and mobiles—
 pleasant, colorful pictures. Elementary school teachers take note: The
 nurses say students could contribute a lot.
- Cash contributions. There are some things the nurses prefer to order like breast pumps and privacy screens for breast feeding, bottle warmers and baby spoons, a rocker recliner, table and lamp.
- Toys. The nursery needs activity toys, too, for siblings of the nursery patients. Books, coloring books and crayons are also needed.

You may deliver or mail items or contributions to Hutzel Hospital, 4707 St. Antoine, Detroit 48201, in care of the Hutzel Hospital Volunteers.

Contributions should be made payable to the Hutzel Hospital Development Fund PCN (progressive care nursery) or include a note specifying what you would like the money to be spent for.

You may call the hospital's volunteer office, 745-7667 Monday through Friday between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m., to ask about donations needed or to volunteer. Volunteers are used for numerous programs from rocking babies to helping young people with orthopedic problems.

Rachel Weeping

Book Review

Rachel Weeping and Other Essays on Abortion," by James Tunstead Burtchaell, C.S.C. (Andrews and McMeel Inc.) 1982. Available through Life Cycle Books, \$13.95, plus \$3 shipping & handling (416-690-5860).

ames Tunstead Burtchaell has liberal and intellectual credentials that are second to none. A Holy Cross priest and once Provost to the University of Notre Dame, he was a latecomer to the life controversies and entered the prolife ranks through the hands of the enemy. The enemy was John D. Rockefeller III.

A skirmish with prolife pickets on University grounds left him with the mind-set that they were "unreasonable, nutty...anti-intellectual." But he began to read more on the subject under debate. So, when John D. Rockefeller III wrote a strong pro-abortion editorial for *Newsweek*, Burtchaell answered it in a letter. This led to an arranged meeting between the two.

Although nothing was changed in Rockefeller, something was changed in Burtchaell. "I came away chastened and thoughtful." He had found, "in the precincts of abortion advocacy, a disrespect for fact, persons and meaning."

He began deliberately to assemble his facts which culminated in the five essays of "Rachel Weeping." At the outset, he examined the "hard cases" that formed the arguments of *Roe v. Wade* (rape and incest, poverty, malformed fetus, etc.), searched for them in the sampling of 100 interviews of post-aborted women as depicted in two books by abortion advocate authors.

He found common symptoms among the aborted women: They

were estranged from a comfortable family circle, submissive to the men who neglected and abused them, and they were incoherent. Finally, the abortion itself was an act "of incoherent self-assertion." Although he admits that out of 1,600,000 yearly abortions there probably are some "hard cases," he found none that surfaced in the two books he studied that were on the side of permissive abortion.

In his book he studies the popular arguments for abortion: "Weeding out the unfit, replacing dirty illegal abortions with safe, aseptic ones, imposing religious dogma on others, well-financed prolifers are callous to those already born." With a surgeon's skilled hand, he cuts away the tainted tissue of these arguments and exposes their true meaning to public view.

"A voice was heard in Ramah, sobbing and loudly lamenting.

It was Rachel weeping for her children, refusing to be comforted because they were no more."

—Jeremiah 30:15-17

In like manner, he vigorously defends prolife assertions that the 1857 Dred Scott decision, as well as the Nazi Holocaust are fitting parallels to the abortion blitz—assertions that drive our opponents up the wall. He tracks the grim Nazi story from its first step of morphine overdosing of retarded children to the Auschwitz guards stripping gold fillings from their victims' teeth.

The Nazis depersonalized their victims: Jews, gypsies, Slavs were "subhuman, vermin." (Similarly, the unborn are a "blob, a fetal pla-

cental unit"). And they euphemized their vocabulary of death: The words used were "evacuation, resettlement (for Jews), the final solution." (Today, it is "quality of life, terminating

pregnancy, alleviating moral distress.")

There is a penetrating study here of how the distortion of language un-



hinged the minds of a nation. Dred Scott was preceded by arguments that the blacks were better off enslaved. ("Everychild a wanted child" is the siren song of Planned Parenthood.)

Finally, in "Abortion and Infanticide," the abiding philosophy of the perpetrators is shown to be that the end justifies the means. The dark spirit of slavery and Nazism reveals itself in the arguments that value life according to its usefulness. The author insists we are corrupted morally when we treat others according to their value.

This is not a new book, but the material herein is as pertinent today as it was at publication. Part of the book's fascination is, frankly, the fact that its author entered the arena of controversy three and a half years after *Roe v. Wade* and through the doors of Rockefeller Center—"the precincts of abortion advocacy." The author made a long journey from the day he encountered "the unreasonable and nutty" pickets on his beloved campus to the last page of "Rachel Weeping."

Such journeys are seldom made without pain. Yet, from page 1, we find the work to be delivered by a hand that never paused, though it may at times, have trembled.

some of Phil Donahue, Sally 'somebody' and Oprah, is addicted to the 11:00 o'clock news and Matlock, gets the normal, "Mom, I'm sorry I'm late" amount of sleep, knows the normal 'Mom type' advice (for the kids and her husband) and a lot of other attributes and capabilities.

That is only part of the picture of the loving woman I come home to in the evening...Mary Ann is involved with the people in her life. The phone rings and she's smiling and discussing a variety of possible topics; an appointment, a meeting at church, friendly advice. And she always seems busy, in the kitchen making a meal, asking for someone to set the table or put their jacket away, taking time to brush the little girl's hair, helping with homework, coping with mounds of laundry, making and keeping doctor's appointments for sick children, keeping immunizations up to date, baking home made cookies, managing the family budget (how do we do it?), paying the bills, grocery shopping (with coupons, yet). Mary Ann also enjoys cake decorating for family birthdays, celebrations and even professionally (weddings).

Mary Ann is the Support Person in our relationship. She's not above shoveling walks (in season, mowing the lawn), taking the car in for repairs, plunging the toilet because our 3-year-old put a toy down it. In the renovation of our home, she personally planned and provided "expert" insight for our contractor; transforming our small 3 bedroom, 1-1/2 bath Ranch style house into a 7 bedroom, 3-1/ 2 bath Colonial (you can imagine the job in keeping it clean). She recently bought the initial lumber and materials for the latest project we've planned. Mary Ann knows that 90% of the job for me is getting started, and she provides that support lovingly. In fact, as a Support Person in the family, our 12-year-old was going to stop delivering a local biweekly newspaper. She made a deal with him, she helps him deliver (for the exercise) and he collects, splitting the earnings 50/50 so he has some spending money. Now to get her to use her small portion for herself and not put it back into the household.

An example of Mary Ann's support for the people in her life is how she provides for my widowed 81-year-old mother who lives alone. My mother has just undergone major surgery. Mary Ann provides shopping and meals, chauffeurs to doctors, helps in explaining and performing sensitive medical procedures, cleans her house, and shares an encouraging word. Her mother-in-law relies on and 'loves her dearly,' and Mary Ann loves her like a daughter. Mary Ann's own widowed mother normally visits a couple times a week. Again, Mary Ann exemplifies the loving supporting daughter and her respect of everyone's right to life.

Mary Ann also loves babies. Her support of Right to Life is as a member and organizer of the Right to Life Committee at St. Mary's of Wayne. She normally does not take the lead on things, but Mary Ann helped initiate the group a few years ago because of the pain and agony she feels for the unprotected unborn. She also works with Lifespan's Wee Care Program, sorting and making up layettes for the newborns. Mary Ann enlisted our married daughter's help, sharing by her example in loving and giving to the helpless unborn. She provides her precious time so that the mothers of these babies can feel the same warmth in caring for their babies that Mary Ann has felt and still longs for when she sees a newborn.

Please accept my nomination of this woman. We are blessed to have such a woman among us.



Contact your U.S. representative and your two U.S. senators today and urge them to oppose the so-called "Freedom of Choice Act" (FOCA, H.R. 25, S. 25). Laws protecting unborn children from abortion after "viability" would be nullified, because the FOCA would permit only the abortionist to determine what "viability" means, and it would strike down all laws that place a time limit on abortions. The bill would also require states to allow unrestricted abortions even in the late stages of pregnancy for "health," which is defined as "emotional...well-being."
- The FOCA permits states to enact regulations "medically necessary" to protect women's health, but the term "medically necessary" is so strictly defined that states would lose the power even to ban abortions by non-physicians.
- The FOCA would require public hospitals to provide abortions.
- The FOCA would prohibit genuine "right to know" and waiting period laws—that is, laws that require that women be provided information on fetal development and alternatives to abortion 24 hours before an abortion is

performed, such as the Pennsylvania law upheld by the Supreme Court in 1992 Casey decision.

Due to the large influx of mail on this and other issues, postcards are being segregated from the regular mail by the Congressional Post Office. There is currently a four-tofive week backlog of postcards. Letters are always preferable to postcards when writing to elected officials, but even more so under these circumstances.

Clinton Urges Repeal of Hyde Amendment

The pro-abortion Clinton Administration called for the repeal of the Hyde Amendment, sending to Congress a budget proposal that would use federal tax funds to pay for abortion on demand.

"Under the President's plan, taxpayers would pay for hundreds of thousands of elective abortions every year, including many late-term abortions," said National Right to Life Committee Legislative Director Douglas Johnson. "We intend to fight the President all the way on this."

Prior to adoption of the Hyde Amendment in 1976, the Medicaid program paid for abortion on demand— 300,000 elective abortions a year.

The Hyde Amendment permits federal funding for abortion only "where the life of the mother would be endangered if the fetus were carried to term," which over the last five years has averaged less than 100 abortions a year.

According to the *New York Times*, White House spokesman George Stephanopoulos said March 29, "This proposal [to repeal the Hyde Amendment] simply tries to preserve the flexibility of the states to make the tough decisions they must make."

"Stephanopoulos' statement is utter nonsense," Johnson said. "Under the Hyde Amendment, each state has the option to fund whatever abortions it chooses, but only 13 do so. Repealing the Hyde Amendment would mandate that all states participate in providing abortion on demand."

President Clinton also said, during his campaign, that abortion would be included in his proposed national health care plan.

Clinton Seeks Funding for UNFPA and IPPF

President Clinton plans to restore U.S. funding to the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), an agency that participates extensively in China's controversial population control program, which coerces women to submit to abortion of "unlicensed" pregnancies.

"President Clinton wants U.S. taxpayers to give \$50 million to an agency that helps run China's coercive abortion program, which has brutalized millions of Chinese women," said National Right to Life Committee Legislative Director Douglas Johnson.

Funding of the UNFPA would violate the 1985 Kemp-Kasten anti-coercion law, which prohibits U.S. funding of any organization that supports a coercive abortion program. However, the Administration apparently intends to certify that the UNPFA is not in violation of the law.

White House Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers said the Clinton Administration regards abortion as "part of the overall approach to population control."

The Administration also plans to restore about \$15 million to the International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF), a London-based consortium that runs campaigns to repeal the pro-life laws that remain in effect in most less-developed nations. The plan to fund IPPF is no surprise in light of the President's Jan. 22 order canceling the "Mexico City Policy," which denied funds to organizations that "perform or actively promote abortion as a method of family planning."

Informed Consent

Informed consent legislation has been reintroduced after dying a slow death in the Michigan House-Senate Conference Committee last year. Identical bills were introduced in the Senate (S.B. 384) by Senator Jack Welborn and in the House (H.B. 4260) by Rep. Jessie Dalman.

The informed consent legislation would require that at least 24 hours prior to performing an abortion, a physician or qualified assistant shall tell the woman the probable gestational age of the fetus, what to do if complications arise, and the abortionist's name. She will also be given a written summary describing abortion procedures, physical and psychological complications of abortion and support services available through public agenices if she chooses to continue her pregnancy. The bill also requires that she be shown a drawing of the actual size of her unborn baby with a description of development. These requirements and waiting period are waived if there is an immediate threat to the woman's life or physical health.

"Women need to understand the entire procedure rather than subjecting themselves to assembly-line abortion clinics that have no long-term interest in their physical or emotional well being," said Sen. Welborn. He also said an important change from last year's bill is the change from the photograph to a drawing of a fetus.

The Senate approved the bill on April 21 by a 26-8 vote. The House bill was assigned to the Committee on Public Health. Hearings are expected to be held on the bill in the House Committee in June. If you are interested in submitting written or oral testimony, please call Linda at 422-6230.

MICHIGAN ABORTION FACTS

The following statistics are from the 1992 Report on Abortions in Michigan, Office of the State Registrar and Center for Health Statistics, Michigan Department of Public Health.

- A total of 34,496 abortions were reported in Michigan in 1992. The number of reported abortions declined just slightly in 1992 (0.2 percent), with 34,555 reported in 1991.
- About 55.4% had no previous induced abortion, while 17.3% reported two or more.
- 56.1% (19,346) of abortions in Michigan were performed in Macomb, Oakland and Wayne Counties.
- Women 17 and younger had 3,081 abortions; 301 of these girls were under 15.
- 188 abortions were performed when the unborn child was over 20 weeks' gestation. Twenty-five showed "evidence of life."
