Lifespan sent the following five-question survey to each Democratic and Republican candidate for U.S. Senate, U.S. House of Representatives and Michigan State House of Representatives:

- 1. If the U.S. Supreme Court should vote to overturn its 1973 decision legalizing abortion on demand, would you <u>SUPPORT</u> legislation permitting states to restore protection to unborn children?
- 2. Do you **OPPOSE** abortion except to save the life of the mother?
- 3. Would you <u>SUPPORT</u> all legislative efforts to prohibit tax-funding of abortion except where necessary to save the life of the mother?
- 4. Would you <u>SUPPORT</u> legislation that would prohibit fetal experimentation and the use of tissue from aborted babies?
- 5. Would you **OPPOSE** legislation that would allow assisted suicide?

NOTE: Lifespan is not a political organization and does not endorse candidates for election. We have surveyed the candidates as a service to our members. The responses we received are printed without bias, although some had to be edited because of space limitations. The questionnaires are onfile at Lifespan's Main Office for your perusal. If you need further verification on a candidate's stand on these or other issues, please contact the candidate directly. Turn to pages 4 and 6 for district maps.


Registering to vote

In Michigan you may register to vote if:

- · You are a United States' citizen
- You are at least 18 years old by election day
- You have lived in Michigan for at least 30 days before the election in which you are voting

To register, simply appear in person at any Secretary of State Branch Office, or at your city, township or village clerk's office. Fill out a form swearing you are who you are, sign your name, and that's it! Under special circumstances you may register by mail.

You may register at any time. However, you must be registered 30 days in advance of an election in order to vote in that election (by July 8, 1996 for the August 6 primary). If you have moved, notify the local clerk. If you move within Michigan during the 60 days before an election, you may vote at your former precinct in that election. You may only be registered in one precinct at a time.



Absentee ballots

According to Michigan law, you are eligible to vote by absentee ballot if one of the following applies:

- · You are 60 years of age or older
- You will be out of town on election day
- You prefer to vote absentee because of illness, physical disability or religious tenets
- You are confined to jail awaiting arraignment or trial
- You are an election precinct inspector in a precinct other than the one where you preside

To get an absentee ballot simply call or write to your city, township or village clerk and ask for an absentee voter application. Or, apply in person to the clerk and fill out a standard form. If you want the ballot mailed to you, your application must be received by 2:00 p.m. on the Saturday before an election date. Your vote must reach your local clerk before the polls close on election day at 8:00 p.m.





Gov. John Engler signed the bill into law on Friday, June 14, 1996.

Clinton, Dole on Assisted Suicide

As rulings from the Ninth and Second Circuits increasingly make assisted suicide a federal issue, presidential candidates of both major parties are issuing new statements.

On April 16, White House deputy press secretary Mary Ellen Glynn announced that President Clinton opposes assisted suicide. Ironically, Clinton's veto message on abortion used a familiar pro-euthanasia argument, justifying the grotesque "partial-birth" procedure by arguing that some of its victims would have died soon outside the womb in any event. The Administration then declined an invitation to testify at Congress's first-ever hearing on assisted suicide.

In a May 2 statement released by his Senate Majority Leader office, Republican presidential hopeful Bob Dole was more forthright. "On this issue," he said, "I happen to share the view of the American Medical Association—that doctors who are sworn to be life-givers, should not act as life-takers, and that the licensing of doctors to administer death is 'fundamentally inconsistent with the pledge physicians make to devote themselves to healing and to life."

have been physically injured from accidents, others suffer from stroke or progressed dementia. In some cases, the brain itself appears to change; in other cases, it appears unchanged.

Some patients are not actually in PVS, but are "locked-in." They may be mute and immobile but mentally alert and able to communicate by blinking or through aids such as a computer—if someone gives them that opportunity.

In any case, the description "PVS" is so elastic that it has been stretched to include those who appear totally unresponsive as well as those like Christine Busalacchi, a young woman who became severely disabled in a car accident, who said "hi," recognized her father on television and pushed a button to play a cassette tape. (In this nationally publicized case, Christine was starved and dehydrated to death—with court approval.)

PVS often misdiagnosed

A recent study indicates that PVS (persistent vegetative state) may often be misdiagnosed in patients with severe brain injuries. Of 49 patients diagnosed with PVS who were referred to the Health Care Rehabilitation Center in Austin, TX, 18 (38%) responded to stimuli during subsequent neurological exams. Investigators were able to identify three-quarters of the misdiagnosed patients within three days of their admittance. In most cases, the patients responded to movement commands; others answered yes or no to questions by mouthing the words or blinking eyes; a few smiled at jokes.

Researchers said that diagnostic errors occur because of the lack of

understanding about what constitutes PVS, a proliferation of ambiguous terms, and as a result of clinicians not spending the time to watch patients carefully or long enough to spot often sporadic signs of cognitive awareness.¹

PVS patients feel pain

Many proponents of death claim that people with PVS are incapable of feeling pain. However, a study by University of Michigan neurologist Kenneth Casey, M.D., revealed that while PVS patients have lost their ability to express responses to pain, they most likely feel pain. Casey based his conclusion on a study of 18 patients who had suffered severe damage to the cortex in one hemisphere of their brains. When painful stimuli were applied, some patients could not identify where the pain occurred other than to say it was on the right or left side of the body. having lost their ability to discriminate, while still feeling the pain. (Dr. Casey believes food and fluids may be withdrawn from PVS patients, but that they should be sedated during the process.)2

Debate over PVS changing

Most people remember the case of Karen Ann Quinlan, which prompted a national debate over withdrawing life-sustaining measures. In her case, it was the ventilator that was in question. Indeed, it turned out to be unnecessary—Karen Ann lived ten years after its removal.

Today, the debate has expanded: (a) many now consider food and water to be optional "medical treatment"; and (b) there are increasing attempts to redefine "death" to include those who are braindamaged.

Calling PVS patients "dead"

New England Journal of Medicine editor Marcia Angell (who has several times endorsed physician-assisted suicide) believes that "dead" should be redefined to include babies born with anencephaly and persons in PVS. A major objection, she admits, is that such patients "just do not look dead."

Nevertheless, she recommends that "we should establish a standard of care that included routinely stopping treatment after a specified time in a [PVS]." If families object to discontinuing treatment, "they would have to justify their position...and the burden [would] be shifted to those holding the idiosyncratic view...Like the redefinition of death, it is also an ethical, social, and legal matter [emphasis added]."³

That's scary and dangerous stuff. In this series, we'll discuss the challenges of caring for persons who are brain injured, including issues of substituted judgment, nutrition and hydration, rehabilitative programs and bias against the disabled. And we'll discover that some cases of "persistent" vegetative state are not that at all.

Persistent Vegetative State Part I

he ultimate focus of euthanasia enthusiasts is not those who are dying. Quite bluntly, nature will take care of them soon enough. The real targets are those who are not dying *quickly enough*, those whose conditions are judged by some to be "hopeless" or "irreversible" or "intolerable." Among these are adults who have become brain damaged with little hope of recovery or improvement.

And indeed, these cases pose serious challenges, even for those who "want to do what's best." Pro-lifers need to become familiar with the terminology and issues, so that we may help others to understand them.

Creating the "need" to call brain-damaged persons "dead"

A person cannot be a "little bit dead" any more than a woman can be a "little bit pregnant." Until death, a person may be seriously ill or injured and dying, but he or she is still very much alive—deserving the respect and basic care due any living, vulnerable person.

People with severe brain damage often can live for years if nutrition and nursing care are adequate and if infections are treated. However, those who embrace a "quality of life" ethic consider life with physical or mental limitations to be "burdensome" and unacceptable. This bias creates the "need" to convince the public that brain-damaged is the same as *dead*.

PVS: a dangerously elastic definition

The words "unconscious," "coma" and "persistent" (or "permanent") "vegetative state" are used to describe severe brain damage. *Coma* is defined as a state of unconsciousness in which a person does not react to stimuli and cannot be aroused. The condition is typically the result of damage to cells in the brain stem from a traumatic head injury, acute illness such as meningitis or lack of oxygen. When a patient emerges from a coma, he or she usually requires physical, speech, cognitive and/or occupational therapy.

Patients who appear conscious but unresponsive after several weeks are often said to be in a *persistent (or permanent)* vegetative state (PVS). The description has also been applied to persons who have lost functioning due to advanced dementia, such as Alzheimer's disease.

Experts disagree about what PVS is; some medical dictionaries do not even include the phrase. While standards have been proposed, they are not accepted by the entire medical community, and methods for diagnostic testing are disputed. Some physicians judge a patient to be in PVS after only weeks of unconsciousness, while others insist it takes months (even years) to get a true reading on a patient's condition.

The person in PVS typically has sleep-wake cycles, eye movement, and normal respiratory, circulatory and digestive functions. Some individuals in this category have random movement, some do not; some can swallow, others cannot. Some
