# Congratulations! "Mother of the Year" Ardis Spalding

In conjunction with our Mother's Day Dinner, we are honoring a special "Mother of the Year." She was nominated by her daughter, Jill Slater, of Livonia. Below is Jill's tribute to her mother.

The baby was large, and his unusual position slowed his descent down the birth canal. His young mother struggled to deliver him safely, and in the process of doing so, she began losing blood. The doctors labored to stop what became massive hemorrhaging. They infused pint after pint of blood in what seemed a downhill battle to save the young woman's life. The hospital priest administered the last rites

even as the physicians continued to work. Then, a miracle: the bleeding

stopped. The woman's condition gradually stabilized. In fact, she was able to return home with her newborn son only a few days later, weakened,

but happy.

Later, during her 6-week postpartum exam, a strange expression crossed her physician's face. "This looks like a pregnant uterus to me!" he exclaimed in disbelief. "It can't be—I just had a baby!" gasped the startled woman. But another miracle had occurred: she was pregnant again.

"You'll never survive this pregnancy," her physician said grimly, and he abruptly left the examining room. When he returned, he carried a long, ominous-looking needle. As the realization of his intent sank in, the woman said, "I can't let you do this." The physician was adamant. "After what we just went through delivering your son, you have no choice. You won't make it through that a second time." He proceeded with his plans to terminate the pregnancy.

### War Casualties

We need to remind ourselves and the nation again and again that the yearly toll by abortion is higher than for all of this country's "regular" wars together.

Each year, approximately 1,600,000 cowardly executions by abortion take place in the nation's abortion chambers. This comes to 30,769 every week, 5,128 every day of a six-day working week, 641 every hour of an eight-hour workday, or more than 10 abortions every minute of the workday.

The casualties of abortion are not only millions of individuals but our whole culture: human life has become cheap; child abuse has risen; the elderly and frail are pressured to sign away their claim to life in pro-death "living wills;" and the disabled are told that their lives lack "quality."

### RU-486 causes deformity

It's now official. An article in the British medical journal, Lancet, has confirmed a case of fetal deformity, whose mother took the French abortion pill RU-486. She took the pill, did not abort, and then decided to carry the baby. The baby was born at 18 weeks and died. According to two professors in Paris, J. C. Pons and E. Papiernik, "the fetus was malformed with sirenomelia, a cleft palate and lip, micrognathia, and hygroma." Translated, the worst of the above deformities was a rather grotesque malformation and fusion of both legs. The doctors made a specific point of saying that there were "no follow-up studies available" on women who did not report back for follow-up at the clinic.

### Abortionists kill three

Three Maryland women died in 1989 as a result of legal abortions. Erica Richardson, 16, died March 2, 1989. The cause—perforated vagina, cervix and uterus, severe internal hemorrhaging, and air embolus. Gladys Estanislao.

28, died May 12, 1989 from a ruptured tubal pregnancy that the abortionist failed to diagnose when he did a suction abortion on her 17 days earlier. Debra Gray, 34, died July 15, 1989. three days after an abortion, during which she had had a cardiac arrest, resulting in destruction of her brain.

None of the three deaths appear in the official Maryland abortion statistics even though they had had wide publicity in the newspapers, with Gray's death publicized on the 60 Minutes TV show. Richardson's autopsy report answers the question how injury occurred by "therapeutic misadventure," and what manner of death by "accident." She was 20 weeks pregnant and the only comment in the entire autopsy relating to that was the last line of the report which said. "according to police reports the deceased was known to have been pregnant. On Gray's autopsy, the manner of death was answered "undetermined" and cause of death was answered "unknown."

### Update on the butcher

Due to a loophole in state law, the Manhattan abortionist who severed a baby's arm in an "unsuccessful" lateterm abortion is still allowed to practice medicine. Dr. Abu Hayat, dubbed "the butcher of Avenue A" by local media for maiming Ana Rosa Rodriguez and allegedly botching several other abortions, had his medical license. suspended since last November, revoked February 25. But because Hayat is appealing the decision, his license was reinstated when the suspension ran out March 3, leaving him free to practice until the appeal is decided. Other cases involving Hayat include that of 17-year-old Sophie McCoy, who bled to death after Hayat allegedly perforated her uterus in a 1990 abortion. On another occasion, Hayat stopped midway through an abortion and refused to complete it until the woman paid an additional \$500.

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# Will it soon be illegal to protect human life?

State politics seemed even weirder than ever last month, when a subcommittee of the Michigan House of Representatives held a public hearing in Oak Park to determine whether the law should ban citizen participation in assisted suicide.

Until very recently, there was little doubt that our legal system had a responsibility to protect human life.

This was what distinguished America from the former Soviet Union, Nazi Germany and "backward" Latin American countries filled with death squads. Human life was protected here.

However, when Dr. Jack Kevorkian invented a "death machine" to help patients die and a judge refused to indict him on felony charges, doubts were raised about whether "assisted suicide" was illegal.

The state Senate tried to clarify the law by passing SB 32, a fairly mild bill banning assisted suicide. SB 32 provided for judicial flexibility by having no minimum sentences and a maximum sentence of four years.

While it passed the Senate, the bill remains bottled up in the House Judiciary Committee. Last year a special subcommittee on Death and Dying was authorized to hold public hearings on it.

Most of those attending the Oak Park hearings in March not only supported the idea of assisted suicide in a few special cases (individuals doomed to die or suffering unrelievable pain), but also seemed against any restriction, arguing that assisted suicide was an inalienable right. Getting help in destroying the self was considered an essential part of self-determination in the Me Generation.

One doctor contended it should be illegal for a hospital to offer "unwanted" medical treatment to someone attempting suicide.

I personally knew two good and brilliant people who took their own

lives. By the doctor's logic, had I been on the scene, given them CPR and called for an ambulance (as I often wished I had been able to do), his ideal society should have arrested me for assault and subjected me to a wrongful life suit.

Despite the constant appeals to the sacred principle of self-determination, there was little emotional concern about ensuring people were not killed against their will—a serious concern of rights advocates in the light of strong prejudice against those with handicaps as well as admissions of passive euthanasia without patient consent.

At the hearing, a representative of the Libertarian Party went so far as to declare that the burden of proof should be on the state to prove that death was not voluntary. In short, when someone is killed, the prosecution should have to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the victim did not want to die. As if things were not dangerous enough.

Both House Judiciary Chairman Perry Bullard and subcommittee Chair H. Lynn Jondahl ignored a moderate plan by the Handicapper Caucus of their own state Democratic Party favoring a ban on assisted suicide until procedures could be agreed upon to ensure patient consent in such cases beyond a reasonable doubt.

Instead Bullard declared last year that he backed a plan by Rep. Tom Power and Sen. David Honigman to set up a commission to "study" the issue for two years, virtually assuring nothing would be done this session.

What, handicappers ask, would happen to patients who might be killed in the meantime? To them, Bullard's plan represents the backward logic of Alice in Wonderland, allowing people to be killed and then studying whether or not they ought to have died.

Detroit Rep. Ted Wallace wants to put on the ballot a plan with some safeguards, ensuring patient consent and competence, but there is a fatal flaw. Wallace's plan ignores self-determination at the other end—the right not to assist in suicide.

A health care institution which did not expressly proclaim that it did not handle assisted suicides would either be bound to perform them or find someone who did.

Certainly proposals raised at the hearing would whittle away age-old safeguards of human life that we cannot afford to lose. Unless legislators hear other views, Michigan may become much more macabre.

"No," she said, firmer now. "God will take care of me. I can't let you do this." The physician became angry, but her quiet resolve won out. Eight months later, her second son was born—strong, healthy and with no complications.

I'm very glad that young woman had the courage of her convictions, because you see, I was the next baby born to this family! That brave young woman was my jewel of a Mom, Ardis Spalding, and I nominate her as Right to Life - Lifespan's "1992 Mother of the Year."

My Mom is the kind of person who simply and quietly lives out her convictions, and leads by the fine example of her life. Here are some of the places she had led her 7 children and 12 grandchildren . . .

Out of gratefulness for the blood she received during my oldest brother's birth, Mom has literally given GAL-LONS of blood over the years! She volunteered at the Red Cross offices and for a local hospital. She sewed clothes and quilts for migrant workers, and dressed dolls to give their children. She wrote letters to orphaned children. She walked our street many times collecting funds for various causes, and rolled miles of hospital bandages for hospitals overseas. She was a deaconess at our church, there for people at their times of greatest joy and deepest sorrow. Her ability to see the needs around her and willingness to respond to them personally has led each of her kids to believe that we could make a difference in this world. Evidence? The fields her kids have chosen: social work, teaching, nursing, engineering, chemistry.

Due to a lack of funds, Mom wasn't able to go to college. But how many evenings I remember her perched on the comfortable steps leading to the study, reading one of our encyclopedias! Every night she worked the crossword puzzle in the local newspaper, faithfully perusing the dictionary until every blank was filled. Her thirst for learning rubbed off, leading each of her 7 kids to college, and some on to Master's degrees.

Mom was concerned about the environment long before Earth Day became trendy. She'd drag 3 complaining kids over to the local schoolyard early Saturday mornings. There we would pick up every piece of broken glass, torn paper or anything else that didn't belong on a playground and throw it into one of the trash bags Mom brought along. When the place was clean, she'd hoist the loaded bags into the trunk, then whisk us still-complaining kids off to Howard Johnson's as a reward. There during brunch we received glowing commendations on our hard work, and our commitment to the environment and our concern for others. Those certainly weren't OUR values at the time. But one of those kids later became an environmental engineer.

Mom's also a one-woman emissary of good will to foreigners visiting our country. Fifteen years ago a group of Nigerian men visited our church. They were in the U.S. for several months, doing something at one of the auto companies. Though she'd never seen them before, Mom adopted the whole bunch of them. We took them on their first bowling outing, had them over for the holidays, transported them to and from church. Since then there have been German students, Chinese students, even a young Korean woman she befriended during an airline flight. She taught us acceptance of other people, and several of her kids continue to reach out to foreigners in our midst.

In spite of all this, and so much more, she has wondered about her effectiveness as a mother. Her own mom died when Ardis was a young girl, so she didn't have a role model to pattern her own parenting after. She sometimes felt unsure of herself, and in the face of the inevitable heartbreaks that mothers live through, she silently agonized over whether she'd have done differently if she'd had a mother to show her the way.

Through the years we kids have mocked her, teased her, argued with her, put up with her. But now, as a mother myself, I praise her and continue to try to follow her lead as I raise my own kids.

I know it isn't the norm to recognize "ordinary" people with special awards.

My mom has never held office for a highly visible club, or organized a fundraiser for a popular cause, or done any of the things for which people are usually cited for award. In fact, if she knew she was being nominated for this award, she'd wonder why. But I am grateful for this chance to shout from the rooftops what I know about those almost invisible, behind-the-scenes efforts that were poured into 7, and now 70 times 7, lives. Thanks, Mom.



## From the President's Desk



My 14-year-old daughter, Mary, is reading Huxley's infamous *Brave New World*. She is naively surprised by the radical concepts and futuristic ideas. I wish I could shelter her from the terrible reality that the brave new world is already upon us.

The theme of the book, written in 1931, is the advancement of science as it affects human individuals. In 1946, Huxley added a forward to his work. In part, he says, "All things considered it looks as though Utopia were far closer to us then anyone, only fifteen years ago, could have imagined. Then, I projected it six hundred years into the future. Today it seems quite possible that the horror may be upon us within a single century."

In my dictionary, a "person" is defined as a "human being." The Supreme Court in 1973 didn't agree with that definition—they wrote their own called, Roe v. Wade. Twenty years later to be a "person" you must have "fundamental cognitive potential."

One case in point is the argument over the baby born in Florida with anencephaly. Poor Baby Theresa was neither a fish nor a vegetable. She was a little girl.

Even pro-abortion newspapers such as the *Detroit Free Press* and the *New York Times* had editorials against harvesting her organs while she was alive. The *Times* said, "If we deny Theresa Ann Campo Pearson her humanity, then we have also denied our own."

Yet these same papers endorse fetal tissue transplants from unborn babies.

On March 11th, the Senate successfully rejected a watered-down House version of the Informed Consent Bill, SB 141, they had originally passed last May. This action sent the bill to a House-Senate conference committee.

Senator Jack Welborn, the sponsor of the bill, is the Chairman of the conference committee. Other members include Senators Dillingham and Pollack and Representatives Berman, Dalman and Hertel.

At this writing, the conference committee has postponed two meetings. Another is planned for May 21st. The conference committee will try to resolve the differences and present a compromise bill to the House and Senate. It must then be voted on as is, no amendments can be added.

The original Informed Consent Bill required a 24-hour waiting period and the physician to give the patient information about the risks of abortion and a description and picture of the probable physical development of her unborn baby. The physician also would have been required to inform the patient that public agencies are available to assist her during pregnancy and after birth, should she choose to give birth, and that help is available to place her child in an adoptive home, should she choose that option.

While the bill would not restrict a woman's "right" to an abortion, it would decrease the demand for abortion. We have heard repeatedly from women that they never would have had an abortion if they had been told the facts prior to the procedure.

On March 5th when the bill was passed by the full House, it was changed so drastically that the only

prolife provision remaining was the 24-hour waiting period. The bill was passed 55-49 by pro-abortion House members and a few prolife crossovers. The crossovers from this area include Bennett, Hertel, Kosteva, W. Bullard and Middleton.

### Assisted Suicide Ban

The Death and Dying Subcommittee of the Michigan House Judiciary Committee held hearings in Michigan on five different bills including Senate Bill 32. This bill to ban assisting in suicides passed the Senate in March, 1991. No other action has been taken.

This legislation will make it illegal if the **intent** is to actively assist a person to commit suicide. The felony is punishable by up to four years in prison and a \$2000 fine. Coercing a suicide would be first-degree murder, mandating a life sentence.

### **Baby Harvesting**

By a lopsided margin, the Senate on April 2 brushed aside prolife objections and passed a bill that would require federal funding of transplantation of tissues "harvested" from aborted babies.

Last July 25, the House passed its version of HR 2507, containing similar fetal tissue provisions, by a vote of 271 to 144. The bill now goes to a House-Senate conference committee, which will develop a final version and send it to President Bush, probably in May. The President is expected to veto the bill because of the fetal tissue provisions and because of other provisions to which the Administration objects.

It requires a two-thirds vote in each house to override a veto. The House will vote first. When the House passed the bill in July, the margin was only five votes short of two-thirds. Thus, prolife strategists expect a close vote in the House.

The current Bush Administration policy allows federal funding of transplants of tissues taken from non-abortion sources, such as miscarriages and ectopic pregnancies. (In an ectopic pregnancy, the fetus implants in the mother's fallopian tube. The condition is life-threatening and requires immediate medical intervention.) The National Right to Life Committee is not opposed to research utilizing tissue taken from such non-abortion-dependent sources.

Federal funding of baby harvesting would place the federal government into direct complicity with the abortion industry. When tied with such "humanitarian" research directives, abortion will gain a more positive and altruistic

image, thus giving the industry the legitimacy that it has long desired.

HR 2507 will soon be sent to President Bush, who is expected to veto it. Prolife forces are concentrating their efforts to sustain the veto in the House, because the Senate passed the bill by well over the two-thirds margin required to override a veto.

Currently, various medical research organizations and pro-abortion organizations are subjecting Members of Congress to intense lobbying to override the anticipated veto.

Grossly exaggerated claims have been made regarding the effectiveness of fetal tissue transplants. In fact, there is very little evidence that fetal tissue transplants will provide a "cure" for any disease.

Prolife citizens must write to or call their U.S. House members and urge them to vote to sustain the President's veto.

### Threat of the Lethal Injection

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England Journal of Medicine, tentatively endorsed euthanasia when she said, "I think perhaps we're ready to consider euthanasia that is very, very strictly controlled."

Other physicians agree. In a Colorado survey, 60 percent of doctors questioned said they have had patients for whom they think euthanasia would have been justified and 59 percent said they would be willing to give such patients a lethal drug if it were legal. A San Francisco Medical Society poll found that 70 percent of doctors surveyed thought incurable patients should be able to request euthanasia; 45 percent said they would be willing to carry it out.

In this context of apparent public support, Initiative 119 in Washington state was placed on the ballot. This initiative would have made Washington the first jurisdiction to permit physicians to kill their consenting terminally ill patients by lethal injection. Voters narrowly rejected the initiative in November 1991, but it came close enough to success to rattle the medical and pro-life communities that opposed it.

The defeat of Initiative 119 did not quiet the pro-euthanasia community. They are continuing similar initiative drives in other states. And those who support legalized physician-assisted killing are waging an intense public relations campaign. Derek Humphry's Final Exit, a how-to suicide manual, reached the top of the New York Times best-seller list. A made-for-television movie, "Last Wish," detailed Betty Rollin's search for a compassionate physician-assisted death for her ill mother.

Despite the outpouring of proeuthanasia support by several professional factions, many medical ethicists and organizations, such as the American Medical Association, oppose active euthanasia. "People favorable to physician-assisted death have not thought it through," Daniel Callahan, director of the Hastings Center, told the Boston Globe. "They're captured by the argument of self-determination and have not begun to think about what are the implications for the medical profession or the potential for abuses."

Sound familiar? Since "choice" in the beginning-of-life debate led to legalized abortion, America has seen the resultant abuses of women and unborn children. Now, as proponents of "choice" push for the right to be killed, a Pandora's box of new abuses will result. What can we expect if physicians are legally permitted to kill their consenting patients?

- 1. Legalized euthanasia would become a substitute for active caring and curing. With an easy "out," clinicians would not have to seek ways to relieve pain, treat symptoms, or even find cures to the diseases that plague us-such as cancer and AIDS. Medical ethicist Dr. Mark Siegler has pointed out that euthanasia "diverts attention from the real issues in the care of dying patients." Among these are improved pain control, better communication between doctors and patients, heightened respect for the patient's right to choose whether to accept life-sustaining treatment, and improved management of the dying process, as in hospice care.
- 2. Legalized euthanasia would bring the law into the sickroom. In the past, courts have kept their distance from the bedside. They trusted physicians, patients and their families to determine the outcome of medical decision making. But if one of the options is active euthanasia, the courts would need to become more active in reviewing bedside decisions in order to prevent abuses.
- 3. Legalized euthanasia would seriously undermine the physician-patient relationship. Patients could no longer trust their physicians to treat and heal. Nor would there be room for patient or family to express an understandable desire for death—without the accompanying fear that one's physician might actively carry out the ambivalent wish. Attorney-physician David Orentlicher says that society now recognizes the right of hopelessly ill patients to decline life-sustaining treatments. But he explains, "Treatment

designed to bring on death, by definition, does not heal and is therefore fundamentally inconsistent with the physician's role in the physician-patient relationship."

4. Legalized euthanasia would lead to the killing of patients who do not wish to die. Patients enfeebled by disease and laden with medical bills may be pressured to "choose" a lethal injection to spare their family and society financial and emotional strain. Others with no viable options—the poor, the elderly, the disabled, women—may find themselves coerced into "requesting" euthanasia. And surrogates will have the legal right to choose euthanasia for an incompetent (even conscious) patient who cannot personally make the decision.

An aging population, spiraling health care costs and an unwary public will increase the pressure to legalize euthanasia. This pressure must be resisted by pro-lifers who understand that the "right" to kill by lethal injection will not enhance personal choice, but will lead to the unwilling deaths of many.

Leon Kass notes, "Euthanasia, once legalized, will not remain confined to those who freely and knowingly elect it—and the most energetic backers of euthanasia do not really want it thus restricted. Why? Because the vast majority of candidates who merit mercy killing cannot request it for themselves: adults with persistent vegetative state or severe depression or senility or aphasia or mental illness of Alzheimer's disease; infants who are deformed; and children who are retarded or dying." If active euthanasia is legalized, no one will be safe from the lethal injection.


While pro-life Americans have directed their energies to the abortion battle, another trend has gathered the steam of public support. Euthanasia. Polls indicate that the majority of Americans want the option of being killed by a physician, despite warnings from prominent ethicists, religious leaders and physicians that such freedom would invite widespread abuse.

Active euthanasia—the intentional taking of a person's life out of motives of mercy—is illegal in every state.

Laws prohibiting euthanasia are based on the ancient Hippocratic Oath that doctors must not "administer a poison to anybody when asked to do so nor... suggest such a course." Yet just as the oath's opposition to abortion has been dismissed by contemporary abortion advocates, the prohibition against physician-assisted killing has been discounted by those who see individual "choice" as the highest value.

Euthanasia organizations have promoted legal and social support for the right to be killed for more than 50 years. But during the past year they have made their most visible inroads.

When pathologist Dr. Jack Kevorkian helped 54-year-old Janet Adkins kill herself in 1990 by infusing a lethal dose of barbiturates and sodium pentothal into her vein, he was labeled a quack.



Homicide charges were dismissed because it was found that Mrs. Adkins, not Dr. Kevorkian, had delivered the poison. Circuit Judge Alice Gilbert permanently barred Dr. Kevorkian from further use of his "suicide machine," but in fall 1991, Kevorkian again surfaced in the national media. He had assisted two women in killing themselves in a remote Michigan cabin.

This time both the medical community and euthanasia advocates spoke out against his actions. "The man's out of control. He's much more like a serial killer than he is a physician," medical ethicist Dr. George Annas charged in an interview with writer Andrea Kott. A spokeswoman for the Hemlock Society, which advocates euthanasia, told reporters Kevorkian's action did not fall within the Society's guidelines that euthanasia only be practiced on those who are terminally ill.

The tone changed in April 1991 when another physician helped his patient kill herself. No longer was the subject in question a retired pathologist using a crude intravenous device. Dr. Timothy Quill was acceptable. Compassionate. Writing in the respected New England Journal of Medicine, Dr. Quill told how he provided his terminally ill patient, Diane, with a prescription for enough sleeping pills to kill herself and an explanation of how to go about it. While Quill's article stirred debate on both sides of the euthanasia issue, his action appeared to engender more support from both physicians and the public than did Kevorkian's.

Indeed, growing numbers of physicians indicate support for the legal right to kill patients who request it. Marcia Angell, executive editor of the *New*
