CANDIDATE SURVEY

LIFESPAN sent the following ten-question survey to each candidate for Governor, U.S. House of Representatives, State Senate, Michigan House of Representatives, County Commissioner and various other offices in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties. Statements provided by candidates are on file at LIFESPAN's Main Office. Please call for further information. (A separate Judicial Candidate Survey was also mailed to candidates for Appeals, Circuit, District & Probate Courts. See pages 13-16.)

- 1. The 1973 U.S. Supreme Court *Roe v. Wade* decision allows for abortion for any reason, even as a method of birth control, even in the late states of pregnancy. Do you SUPPORT the reversal of this decision?
- 2. Do you SUPPORT a law banning partial-birth abortions?
- 3. Some public funds are used for abortions or abortion referrals, such as funding for Planned Parenthood. Do you OPPOSE the use of public funds (i.e. Planned Parenthood) for abortion or abortion referrals?
- 4. Human embryonic stem cells and human fetal tissue are used in some medical experimentation which has no beneficial effects for the fetus. Would you SUPPORT legislation that would prohibit the use of embryonic stem cells and fetal tissue research, especially when the killing of the preborn child is necessary for this type of experimentation?
- 5. Would you SUPPORT a law banning so-called "reproductive cloning" cloning meant to result in the birth of a baby?
- 6. Knowing that the removal of stem cells from human embryos results in the death of those embryos, would you SUPPORT a law banning so-called "therapeutic cloning" (somatic cell nuclear transfer)?
- 7. Do you OPPOSE laws allowing assisted suicide (so called "aid in dying")?
- 8. Do you SUPPORT honoring the wishes of patients who want life-saving treatment (including food and water) regardless of their degree of disability, age and "quality of life"?
- 9. Do you SUPPORT legislation that would protect health care professionals from being forced to distribute medications or provide medical care that violates their moral or religious beliefs?
- 10. Are you a member of a Pro-Life organization? If Yes, in 50 words or less, describe your prolife support or activities.

NOTE: LIFESPAN is not a political organization and does not endorse candidates for election. We have surveyed the candidates as a service to our members. The questionnaires are on file at LIFESPAN's Main Office for your perusal. If you need further verification on a candidate's stand on these or other issues, please contact the candidate directly.

LIFESPAN Candidate Survey

Right to Life - LIFESPAN, Inc., is a non-profit educational and legislative organization. The first informs and motivates people to do something. The second speaks to changing laws. LIFESPAN can take sides and urge passage of legislation which is called lobbying. LIFESPAN is not "political." LIFESPAN does not have a political action committee (PAC) to elect or to defeat candidates. However, we can publish candidate surveys. This has been clearly permitted on a number of occasions by the U.S. Supreme Court. We can also list office holders and tell you how they have voted on various issues. Such reporting, as we do it, is not "political." Because this comes under Freedom of the Press, such information can be passed out through churches, without jeopardizing their tax status (again by a decision of the U.S. Supreme Court). According to legal terminology, this corporation can engage in "issue advocacy." The responses to the survey questions are dependent on the honesty and integrity of the individual candidates. LIFESPAN is not responsible for any candidate's response that differ from his or her public stance of the issues. Any questions or discrepancies should be directed to the candidate. 💠

JULY 9 - Last day to register for August Primary Election

AUGUST 4 (by 2 pm) - Electors who wish to receive an absent voter ballot for the August Primary by mail must submit absent voter ballot applications.

AUGUST 4 (up to 4 pm) - Electors qualified to obtain an absent voter ballot for August Primary may vote in person in clerk's office.

AUGUST 7 (TUESDAY) - STATE PRIMARY

OCTOBER 9 - Last day to register for the November General Election.

NOVEMBER 3 (by 2 pm) - Electors who wish to receive an absent voter ballot for the November General Election by mail must submit absent voter ballot applications.

NOVEMBER 5 (up to 4 pm) - Electors qualified to obtain an absent voter ballot for the November General Election may vote in person in the clerk's office.

NOVEMBER 6 (TUESDAY) - GENERAL ELECTION

Register and Vote!

Never underestimate the power of the ballot.

One of the greatest strengths of America is that all citizens are provided a voice through the voting booth. And every vote does count! Many an election has been won by a handful of votes or even just one vote.

But before you can vote in an election, you must be registered. Registering to vote is an easy process. In fact, Michigan was the first state in the nation to implement "motor/voter" registration, allowing residents to register to vote at any Secretary of State branch office. Today, over 88 percent of all eligible voters are registered.

To register, you must be a U.S. citizen, at least 18 years old by election day and a Michigan resident. Any Secretary of State branch office or county, city or township clerk's office can register you. In addition, specified agencies providing services through the Department of Human Services, the Department of Community Health, the Michigan Jobs Commission, and military recruitment centers also provide voter registrations services.

You may also register to vote by mail - forms are available at your local clerk's office or from the Secretary of State website. If you register to vote by mail, and you have moved to a new voting jurisdiction or are registering for the very first time, you must vote in person in the first election in which you participate. The only exceptions are if you are 60 years old or older, disabled as defined by law or temporarily living overseas.

You also have the option of registering to vote when you renew your driver license by mail. Eligible drivers receive a voter registration in the mail with their driver license renewal information.

As you can see, there are several options for you to choose from when registering to vote. But no matter where or how your register, you will vote in your assigned precinct in your hometown.

Absentee Voting

- Send your absentee ballot request form to your clerk at: www.michigan.gov/sos

Absentee voter ballots are available for all elections. They provide voters with a convenient method for casting a ballot when they are unable to attend the polls on election day.

As a **registered** voter, you may obtain an absentee ballot if you are:

- ♦ Age 60 years old or older
- Unable to vote without assistance at the polls
- Expecting to be out of town on election day
- ♦ In jail awaiting arraignment or trial
- Unable to attend the polls due to religious reasons
- Appointed to work as an election inspector in a precinct outside of your precinct of residence

A person who registers to vote by mail must vote in person in the first election in which he or she participates. The restrictions does not apply to overseas voters, voters who are disabled or voters who are 60 years of age or older. (Voting in person on one governmental level clears the restriction on the other levels. For example, if a voter subject to the restriction votes in person at a school election, the voter would be free to obtain an absentee ballot for the first state election in which he or she wishes to participate.)

Requesting an Absentee Voter Ballot

Your request for an absentee voter ballot must be in writing and can be submitted to your city or township clerk. (For assistance in obtaining the address of your city or township clerk, see www.michigan.gov/vote). Your request must include one of the six statutory reasons stated above and your signature. You must request an absentee voter ballot by mailing the application, a letter, a postcard, or a pre-printed application form obtained from your local clerk's office. Requests to have an absentee voter ballot mailed to you must be received by

your clerk no later than 2 pm the Saturday before the election.

Once your request is received by the local clerk, your signature on the request will be checked against your voter registration record before a ballot is issued. You must be a registered voter to receive an absentee ballot. Requests for absentee voter ballots are processed immediately. Absentee ballots may be issued to you at your home address or any address outside your city or township of residence.

After receiving your absentee voter ballot, you have until 8 pm on election day to complete the ballot and return it to the clerk's office. Your ballot will not be counted unless your signature is on the return envelope and matches your signature on file. If you receive assistance voting the ballot, then the signature of the person who helped you must also be on the return envelope. Only you, a family members or person residing in your household, a mail carrier, or election official is authorized to deliver your signed absentee voter ballot to your clerk's office.

If an emergency, such as a sudden illness or family death prevents you from reaching the polls on election day, you may request an emergency absentee voter ballot. Requests for an emergency ballot must be submitted after the deadline for regular absentee voter ballots has passed by before 4 pm on election day. The emergency must have occurred at a time which made it impossible for you to apply for a regular absentee voter ballot. Your local clerk will have more information about emergency absentee voter ballots. ❖

American Medical Association Says No to Assisted Suicide

he AMA was asked by legislation activists to revisit its decades-long opposition to legalizing assisted suicide, specifically, to distinguish between suicide and the euthanasia movement's favorite euphemism, "aid in dying."

Big mistake. The Ethics Committee reiterated its opposition to legalization in full, with some wisdom worth recounting here.

First, the AMA rejects the nonsense that assisted suicide isn't suicide. From "Report of the Council on Ethical and Judicial Affairs," CEJS Report 5-A-18 (my emphasis):

The council recognizes that choosing one term of art over others can carry multiple, and not always intended messages. However, in the absence of a perfect option, CEJA believes ethical deliberation and debate is best served by using plainly descriptive language.

Exactly what I have been saying. But I digress:
In the council's view, despite its negative
connotations, the term "physician assisted
suicide" describes the practice with the greatest
precision. Most importantly, it clearly
distinguishes the practice from euthanasia. The
terms "aid in dying" or "death with dignity"
could be used to describe either euthanasia or
palliative/hospice care at the end of life and this
degree of ambiguity is unacceptable for providing
ethical guidance.

Yes! But of course, those are the very reasons activists want to use the term.

The opinion also notes that the "guidelines will prevent abuse" meme hasn't exactly worked in Netherlands and Belgium:

Although cross-cultural comparisons are problematic, current evidence from Europe present a cautionary tale. Recent findings from studies in Belgium and the Netherlands, both countries that permit euthanasia as well as physician-assisted suicide, mitigate some fears but underscore others. For example, research in the Netherlands has found that "requests characterized by psychological as opposed to physical suffering were most likely to be rejected... At the same time, however, among patients who obtained euthanasia or assisted suicide, nearly 4 percent "reported only psychological suffering."

This may be old news. Recently published data show that more than 80 mentally ill patients were euthanized in

2017 in the Netherlands, which happens in Belgium too.

The report shows that oversight in Netherlands tends to be a rubber-stamp affair, which I assert also happens in Oregon.

Studies have also raised questions about how effective retrospective review of decisions to provide euthanasia/assisted suicide is in policing practice. A qualitative analysis of cases that Dutch regional euthanasia committees determined had not met legal "due care criteria" found that such reviews focus on procedural considerations and do not "directly assess the actual eligibility" of the patients who obtained euthanasia.

A separate study of cases in which psychiatric patients obtained euthanasia found that physicians' reports "stated that psychosis or depression did or did not affect capacity but provided little explanation regarding their judgments" and that review committees "generally accepted the judgment of the physician performing EAS [euthanasia or physician-assisted suicide]".

The report notes that quality end-of-life care is unequally available in the country, and is a particular problem for poor populations.

The report concluded:

After careful consideration, CEJA concludes that in its current form, the Code offers guidance to support physicians and the patients they serve in making well-considered, mutually respectful decisions about legally available options for care at the end of life in the intimacy of a patient-physician relationship. The Council on Ethical and Judicial Affairs therefore recommends that the Code of Medical Ethics not be amended.

Good. A doctor's role is to heal, palliate, counsel, and treat. It should never be to help kill.

Editor's Note:



Vermont Right to Life Treasurer Aids Investigation Leading to Arrests in National Scam

Editor's Note: When being solicited by phone to donate to a prolife group, be wary. Call our office for verification. Better yet, give locally! Then you can see your donated dollars at work.

hen Vermont Right to Life Committee Treasurer, Sharon Toborg, received a telemarketing phone call at her home urging her to help end abortion, she looked into the organization making the request. But Toborg, who has been affiliated in several capacities with VRLC for over 30 years, had never heard of the "National Campaign PAC" organization to which she was being asked to donate. As she started researching the group her worst suspicions were confirmed.

Toborg discovered that, according to Federal Election Commission filings, the organization was pulling in millions of dollars to supposedly promote pro-life causes, but it appeared to her that they were mostly paying some businesses. Toborg warned VRLC members not to donate to the fake organization and emphasized that Vermont Right to Life has not solicited funds by telephone for years. Her warning went national when it was picked up by a national pro-life news service.

She also requested that those who received a letter or a pledge card from National Campaign PAC send a copy to VRLC to help her further investigate. Letters and pledge forms came in from around the country and Sharon kept them on file.

As a result, Sharon Toborg was able to assist investigators from the U.S. Attorney's Office from the Southern District of New York looking into criminal and fraudulent activity by the phony group. On May 17th, those same investigators called Sharon to let her know that arrests had been made in the case. Two Arizona men have been charged in Manhattan Federal Court with fraud and mon-



ey laundering, allegedly defrauding donors of more than \$23 million in a scheme that involved numerous scam political action committees – one of them being the "National Campaign PAC."

As investigators noted in their complaint:

The National Campaign PAC...asserted that its "mission is to save unborn babies from abortion" and that its goal was to "change hearts, change leaders and change laws until the day arrives when every child is welcomed into life and pro tected by law." It solicited donations, by phone and mail, under the "project" name of the "Pro-Life Committee."

President Trump Taking Major Step Toward Ending Taxpayers' Forced Partnership with Abortion Industry, says Family Research Council

he Trump administration is expected to announce today new regulations for the Title X family planning program that reinstates President Ronald Reagan's "protect life rule" which protects the integrity of the program by preventing the "co-location" of family planning clinics with abortion clinics. This rule will separate abortion centers, such as Planned Parenthood, from the thousands of clinics that provide Title X services without cutting any funds.

Family Research Council President Tony Perkins commented:

"President Trump's HHS is taking a major step toward the ultimate goal of ending taxpayers' forced partnership with the abortion industry. The new regulations will draw a bright line between abortion centers and family planning programs -- just as the federal law requires and the Supreme Court has upheld.

"It's a shame that the federal Title X family planning program has been comingled with abortion ever since President Bill Clinton issued regulations not only removing the wall of separation President Reagan issued, but even requiring groups to refer for abortion. The result is that Planned Parenthood





-- an organization that's been under criminal investigation for selling baby body parts -- gets roughly \$60 million per year through what has become a slush fund for the abortion giant.

"Planned Parenthood and other abortion centers will now have to choose between dropping their abortion services from any location that gets Title X dollars and moving those abortion operations offsite. Either way, this will loosen the group's hold on tens of millions of tax dollars.

"The pro-life Congress will get another crack at Planned Parenthood's federal gravy train in multiple federal programs in which they get over \$400 million each year. Until then, President Trump continues to fulfill his campaign promise that his administration will advocate for mothers and their unborn children every day he occupies the White House and take important steps to ensure taxpay-

ers are not subsidizing the abortion industry," concluded Perkins.
